


Enjoy our Nature Trails

Wander through very rare remnant and restored tallgrass prairie, oak savanna, and wetlands on over 2 miles of hiking trails. Discover a rich diversity of plant and animal life – more than 275 species of native flowers and grasses can be found in our 120-acre restoration. These diverse ecosystems support a variety of bird species, including cranes!

Wild Sandhill Cranes nest in Gromme Marsh each year, usually between April 15th and July 1st. To give them the privacy they need to incubate their eggs and care for their chicks, please observe any trail closure signs you encounter. At other times of the year, before the chick is able to fly, you may meet the Sandhill family on our trails. Stay at a safe distance and never come between the adults and chicks. Views of the cranes may be possible from Restoration Overlook.



Please respect our cranes and their home.

Do not call to the cranes or mimic their movements.

Stay behind the guardrails at all times.

Cranes are omnivorous. Please don't share food with them.

Feathers are neat, but not to keep. It is illegal to possess crane feathers without a federal permit. Our naturalists can show you feathers up close.

Stay on marked trails and paths. Leave flowers and grasses for everyone to enjoy. Our staff is happy to help with plant identification.

Help keep our site clean. Cranes can mistake litter that blows into their enclosures for food.

Pets are not permitted. Only fully-trained service animals are allowed in the facility.

Our site is smoke-free, including e-cigarettes.



Johnson Exhibit Pod

Whooping Crane Exhibit

Sit in the comfort of a covered amphitheater while you visit with a pair of the rarest cranes. In this Wisconsin wetland setting you will learn how the International Crane Foundation is working to bring North America's tallest flying bird back from the brink of extinction.
